

As a rule - we discuss what's new in 2019

"How dreadful ... to be caught up in a game and have no idea of the rules."

So said the American writer, Caroline Stevermer. She may not have had golf in mind at the time but nothing could be more pertinent to the position many golfers are in at this time.

For two weeks now golfers, professional and amateur alike, have been coming to terms with the new rules that came into force on January 1 2019.

As players, it is our duty to understand and play to these new rules. In these pages we will, over the coming weeks, strive to provide information and guidance to help you understand these new rules so you can enjoy your game without incurring the wrath of your playing partners and/or risking disqualification.

English Golf has published a set of very useful documents that explain the new rules and the rationale behind their introduction.

In TTNB Issue 066 dated October 29 2018, we summarised the rule changes

and this may also prove to be a useful reference point.

In this issue we only have space to mention a few of the more important changes but in later issues we will be covering specific changes in more detail:

Today's selection:

* You can now putt with the flagstick left in as the ball can hit the flagstick without penalty. This will prove a real time saver.

* The search time for a lost ball is reduced from five minutes to three.

* Dropping must now be from knee height. This is to increase the chance of a ball staying in a dropping area but it seems strange. If you forget and use the old method you can take another drop without penalty but playing on without re-dropping carries a one shot penalty.

* If a player's ball accidentally hits himself or his equipment then there is no penalty and the ball is played as it lies. Note: the emphasis should be on 'accidentally'.

* There is no penalty for making a double hit and it counts as one shot.

* Loose impediments such as stones, twigs, leaves and fir cones can be removed without penalty from bunkers and penalty areas.

* You are now allowed to repair damage (eg spike marks, embedded stones etc) on the green whether or not your ball lies on the green.

Stroke and distance - watch this space

There is one new rule that is worthy of further explanation. When they were announced it was suggested that the stroke and distance penalty for a lost ball or a ball out of bounds was to be replaced by allowing the player to drop a ball on the edge of the fairway at the point of entry, at the cost of a two-stroke penalty. The idea was that it would save players making the long walk back to play a second ball.

At this point CONGU intervened ruling that this would not apply to any qualifying or handicap-based competitions and it was amended to become a local rule. It is now up to individual clubs to decide if the amendment would apply in nonqualifying comps and social golf.
