
Darren, who has been running for four years and training specifically for the marathon for five months, ran the 26.2 miles in a highly commendable 4hrs 44min 07secs.

As someone charged with closing down competitions at the club, I wonder whether this approach will work with those who submit competition cards at West Berks. Surely it's worth a try so here goes:

Dear Competitor,

I hope you don't mind but there are just a couple of trivial matters that I would like to draw to your attention.

Firstly, when you enter a competition I wonder if I could ask you, only if it's not too much trouble of course, to just jot your name down on the card that you return. You would be surprised how much easier it is for us to know who has actually entered the competition.

Also, if you have time I wonder if you could be so kind as to write legibly. I don't want to sound picky but it really is a great help if we can read what's on the card.

There are also a couple of other things that would be rather helpful. We would be most obliged if you could bring yourself to enter the final score in the large rectangular box at the bottom of the card. Also, if you are lucky enough to score a two, we would recommend that you circle the score so we can be sure that you get your deserved share of the spoils.

Finally, I really can't stress enough how important it is for you to enter your handicap on the card, the correct gross scores at each hole in the space provided and ensure that both yourself and the marker sign the card. Failure to do this will result in automatic disqualifications. Actually, this is not too much of a problem for us: we just whack down DQ and go to the next card.

That's really all I have at the moment. I am so grateful that you have spared the time to give this humble missive your valuable attention.
