Ouch! Eddie's costly mistake

THERE WAS a bit of a hoo-ha recently when local lad made good, Eddie Pepperell, was disqualified from the Qatar Open for signing for a score lower than his correct score.

No problem there of course but in truth it was a bit more complicated than that. This is what happened - you may need a pencil and paper – I did!

His playing partner, who was marking his card, had recorded a 5 on the 11th where he actually made a 6, and a 4 on the 16th where he made 3.

Eddie correctly picked up on this and adjusted his card before signing and this would have been OK except while altering the score he made a costly error. He adjusted 11 to show the correct score of 6 but instead of changing 16 from 4 to 3 he changed the score on 17 instead.

This meant that on holes 11, 16 and 17 he had actually scored 6, 3 and 4 but he returned scores of 6, 4 and 3. The returned total was correct but the score recorded on 17 was lower than his score and therefore it was a DQ because Rule 3.3b (3), clearly states that when the returned score is 'lower than the actual score or no score returned the player is disqualified.'

As a reminder, if he had recorded a number that was higher than his actual score, the higher score would have stood and he would not have been disqualified.

Eddie accepted his fate with good grace but surely this is a lesson to us all. If a pro playing in a top tournament with all the checks in the marker tent can fall foul of the laws, it can happen to any of us. It may not be as expensive but it will be just as annoying.

Entering your correct handicap and your correct gross score is just about all you, as a competitor, are responsible for, all the rest is down to the organising committee. But it's costly when you get it wrong.
